Chris Yost (X-Force) and Scott Wegener's (Atomic Robo) Killer of Demons is a three-issue collection full of laugh-outloud humor and slam-bang action with a compelling story to boot-the kind of comic you just can't dislike.

Teamed with a stogie-smoking cherub to convince him he's doing God's work, current Killer of Demons and junior account executive Dave Sloan starts racking up a body count slicing through Satan-sent baddies only he can see while leaving corpse-filled White Castles in his wake. But the blood on his hands quickly leads Dave to think he's off his rocker, instead of Heaven's force for good against the burning legions from below.

Between fighting satanic underage stripper assassins and legions of demons, hiding his heavenly mission from his cop girlfriend and going up against the devil himself, Dave's battle with his own sanity might be the easiest fight he has in the whole series.

The setup isn't completely unfamiliar, as KOD is at times reminiscent of "Buffy The Vampire Slayer" and "Army of Darkness" with a bit of "Shaun of fhe Dead" peppered into the mix. But the Yost-penned witty banter and visceral action sequences by Wegener are sure to make this an instant favorite for fans of the aforementioned flicks-not to mention many other comic aficionados AUG 12 | \$12.99 • JIM GIBBONS

FINAL CRISIS: REVELATIONS HC

Part tie-in to Grant Morrison's mega-summer event and part capper of his own long-running set of stories about Renee "The Question" Montoya and Crispus "The Spectre" Allen, writer Greg Rucka presents equal amounts of creepy shocks and spiritual awakenings in Revelations. When the pair of tortured former detectives get trapped in a church with new heroine The Radiant while a Cainpossessed Vandal Savage pounds at the gates, they each experience a final crisis of faith. Philip Tan's shadowy art helps drive the story forward with horror-tinged tension, but the lack of connection between Judeo-Christian myth and the world of the New Gods makes this series feel slight for non-fans of Rucka's favorite characters. PUNISHER: DARK REIGN HC MARVEL

On Aug. 19, DC's mature readers imprint launches Vertigo Crime, a new initiative dedicated to the mystery and crime stories the publisher does best. Wizard got early editions of the first two 5.5-by-8-inch graphic novels (\$19.99 each), and here are the verdicts:

DARK ENTRIES

Who better to kick off Vertigo Crime than the publisher's prime paranormal investigator John Constantine? Veteran British crime writer Ian Rankin (Inspector Rebus novels) teams with artist Werther


Dell'Edera (Loveless) to put the Hellblazer through his paces as he's hired to investigate the set of creepy new reality TV show "Dark Entries." Constantine enters a house full of 20-somethings tweaking out on personal terrors before the producers have even attempted to try creeping them out. Or so it seems.

Without spoiling the killer twist,

it turns out things are far more frightful than they initially appeared, and it's up to Constantine to play detective, see how the pieces fit and find a way out of one helluva haunted house. Rankin's setup and unraveling mystery are solid and he gives Hellblazer plenty of flawlees one-liners, all complemented by Dell'Edera's simple-yet-haunting interiors. • JG

Knowing that current hell lord Neron being subverted by this new "less evil" damnation will have dire consequences. an all-star cast of Earth's mystical heroes must decide how they can best sway the outcome of the war. X-FACTOR: TIME AND A HALF PREMIERE HC



Rock, you're bound to find a footlocker full of interesting and enthralling information here. UNSTOPPABLE USAGI

Stan Sakai celebrates his rabbit samurai's 25th anniversary with a massive slipcover edition and a brand new color graphic novel

From his furry top knot to his ferocious sword skills, Stan Sakai's rabbit warrior Usagi Yojimbo continues to thrill readers with his smart, often supernatural tales of life in ancient Japan. And he's been at it for 25 years.

In celebrating Usagi's quarter-century of high-kicking, Sakai looks back to his earliest days with *Usagi Yojimbo: The Special Edition* (Fantagraphics, \$95), an August-shipping, two-volume slipcase reprinting the character's earliest appearances. And if 25 years sounds long for fans, the artist himself remains quite thrown when he thinks about the mindset he had drawing Usagi in 1984.

"Basically, I was more concerned about what I was doing the next month than what I was doing in 25 years. I never thought I'd be doing Usagi for so long. It's great, and I love it, but back then I couldn't have imagined that," laughs the artist.

"Even my approach to storytelling is different," Sakai says of his work today. "[Looking back on an old story recently] there were panels and plot things where I thought, 'Why did I do that?' It was very



different and interesting for me because I got to compare the choices I made back then to what I would do now. It was a big eye-opener for how much Usagi has changed."

On top of the killer reprints, current Usagi publisher Dark Horse plans to make the anniversary special with Usagi Yojimbo: Yokai (\$14.95)—a new, fully painted story coming to shops this November that Sakai referred to as "the most ambitious color story I've done."

"The story revolves around the Yokai-the ghosts and goblins of Japanese mythology. I love that stuff because Japan has such a rich tradition of folklore and monsters and demons. I included a lot of both the really horrible stuff as well as the really funny characters. It revolves around an event called The Light Parade of 100 Demons. There's a Japanese belief that once a year, all the Japanese monsters gather together and parade through the countryside. To look upon them, you'd die instantly. But on this night, they want to conquer the Earth. And Usagi and Sasuké the wizard have to defeat them." • KP
